VIRGINMARTYR GLYCERIA AT HERACLEA


St. Glyceria came from an illustrious family; her father was a high-ranking Roman official. She lost both her parents at an early age. She met Christians and converted to Christianity. However, the prefect of her city ordered all to offer sacrifice to the idols. St. Glyceria made a sign of the Cross on her forehead and went into the pagan temple. She prayed God would bring the pagans to their senses and destroy the statue of Zeus. Suddenly thunder was heard, and the statue crashed to the floor and shattered.

Sabinus, the prefect, ordered the people to stone St. Glyceria, but the stones did not touch her. She was locked in prison, where the Christian priest Philokrates came to her and encouraged the martyr in the struggle ahead of her. In the morning, when the tortures had started, an angel appeared in their midst, and the torturers fell to the ground in terror. When the vision vanished, Sabinus ordered St. Glyceria thrown into prison. The door was sealed so no one could get in. Angels of God brought St. Glyceria food and drink. Many days afterward, Sabinus came to the prison; he removed the seal from the door and went in. He was shaken when he saw her alive and well.

Sabinus took her to the city of Heraclea. Christians came out to meet her and encourage her. She was cast into a red-hot furnace but the fire was extinguished at once. The prefect ordered her skin ripped from her head; she was then thrown into prison onto sharp stones. She prayed incessantly, and at midnight an angel appeared and healed her wounds.

When the jailer came in the morning, he didn't recognize her. He feared he would be punished for letting her escape, but St. Glyceria reassured him. He came to believe in God and told everyone about the miraculous healing and confessed himself a Christian. He was beheaded. Christians secretly buried him.

St. Glyceria was sentenced to be eaten by wild beasts, but the lioness meekly crawled up to her and lay at her feet. Finally the saint prayed to the Lord, imploring He take her unto Himself. She heard a voice from Heaven, summoning her to heavenly bliss. At that moment another lioness was set loose upon the saint. It pounced upon the martyr and killed her but did not tear her apart. Christians reverently buried her; her holy relics were glorified with a flow of healing myrrh. She suffered for Christ around the year 177.

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SELECTIONS FROM ST. MAXIMUS THE CONFESSOR - IV

- 30. The one who is perfect in love and has reached the summit of detachment knows no distinction between oneself and another, between faithful and unfaithful, between slave and freemen, or indeed between male and female. But having risen above tyranny of the passions and looking to the one nature of men he regards all equally and is equally disposed to all. For in him there is neither Greek nor Jew, neither male nor female, neither slave nor freeman, but Christ is everything and in everything.
- 35. There are many things done by men which are noble in themselves but still because of some reason are not noble. For example, fasts and vigils, prayers and psalmody, almsgiving and hospitality are noble in themselves, but when they are done out of vainglory, they are no longer noble.
- 38. The demon of pride has a twofold wickedness; either he induces a person to ascribe their virtuous deeds to themselves and not to God the bestower of good things and the helper in good behavior, or, unable to persuade him in this, he suggests that they look down on others who are still less advanced than they are. The one who behaves in this way does not realize that they are being induced into denying God's assistance. For if they look down on others as those who are unable to perform good deeds, they are evidently putting themselves forward as someone who acts uprightly on their own power; but this is impossible, as the Lord says, "Outside of Me you can do nothing." Because of our weakness, when moved to do good things, we are unable to complete them without the bestower of good things.
- 43. So long as you have evil habits, do not refuse to undergo challenges and hardships, so that you may be humbled by them and purge out pride.
- 58. The love of God induces the one who possesses it to despise every passing pleasure and every trouble and sorrow. All the saints, who have suffered much with joy for Christ, should convince you of this.
- 79. The image of the earthly man consists in the capital vices, such as folly, cowardice, intemperance, injustice. The image of the heavenly man consists in the cardinal virtues, as prudence, courage, temperance, justice. So, "as we have borne the image of the earthly man, so let us bear the image of the heavenly man."
- 93. Death is, properly speaking, separation from God, and "the sting of death is sin." In taking on sin, Adam was banished at once from the tree of life, from Paradise and from God, whereupon there followed of necessity the death of the body. On the other hand, life is, properly speaking, the One who says, "I am the life" (John 14:6). By His death He brought back to life again the one who had died.
