HOLY RIGHTEOUS ANCESTORS OF GOD, JOACHIM AND ANNA

St. Joachim, the son of Barpathir, was of the tribe of Judah, and was a descendant of King David, to whom God had revealed that the Savior of the world would be born from his seed.


St. Anna was the daughter of Matthan the priest, who was of the tribe of Levi. St. Anna's family came from Bethlehem.

The couple lived at Nazareth in Galilee. They were childless into their old age, and all their life they grieved over this. They had to endure derision and scorn, since at that time childlessness was considered a disgrace. They never grumbled, but fervently prayed to God, trusting in Him.

Once, during a great feast, the gifts which Joachim took to Jerusalem as an offering to God were not accepted by the priest Reuben, who considered that a childless man was not worthy to offer sacrifice to God. This pained the old man very much, and he, regarding himself the most sinful of all people, decided not to return home but to settle in solitude in a desolate place.

When St. Anna learned what humiliation her husband had endured, she sorrowfully entreated God with prayer and fasting to grant her a child. In his desolate solitude, the righteous Joachim also asked God for this. The prayer of the saintly couple was heard. An angel told them that a daughter would be born to them, who would be blessed above all other women. He also told them that she would remain a virgin, would be dedicated to the Lord and live in the Temple and would give birth to the Savior. Obeying the instructions of the heavenly messenger, Sts. Joachim and Anna met at the Golden Gate in Jerusalem. Then, as God promised, a daughter was born to them, and they named her Mary.

St. Joachim died a few years later at the age of 80, after his daughter went to live in the Temple. St. Anna died at the age of 70, two years after her husband.

CHURCH SCHOOL

Sunday, September 9 is the first day of this year's Church School program. This gives us an opportunity to honor our Church School teachers, students and their parents. Over the years we have been blessed with many excellent teachers and helpers, all of whom worked as volunteers, for the love of God and for the Church. Our outstanding present teachers, Laura Gluntz and Stephanie McNeely, together with Church School Coordinator Nellie Wislocki, continue the legacy that has been an important part of Holy Trinity Church since its beginning.



Education is a fundamental aspect of the Church. We gather at Church for both liturgical celebration *and* spiritual learning. An important event in the life of our Lord, Jesus Christ Himself shows how important education is. This event is depicted in an icon called "Christ in the Temple." (The reproduction above is similar to the one we have on the left wall in the north-east corner of our church.) It is the story of religious education in action. We see a young, twelve-year-old Jesus among the learned scholars in the Temple in Jerusalem. The Gospel of St. Luke tells us that Jesus was "sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions" (Luke 2:46). The icon portrays Jesus in the act of teaching because Our Lord is the "Teacher," who teaches us how important learning is.

One of the early Church Fathers, Clement of Alexandria, said, "Knowledge is God's treasure given to us for our benefit." To obtain knowledge we need to study, read and write. In other words, to learn! It begins in childhood, and that requires special attention and support, which is what we acknowledge in our parish today. However, learning is a life-long enterprise, and we pray and hope that love of spiritual learning will remain with our children thoughout their lives.
