


PROPHET ELISHA

The Holy Prophet Elisha lived in the ninth century BC., and was a native of the village of Abalmaum, near Jordan. By the command of the Lord, he was called to prophetic service by the holy Prophet Elijah.

Elisha worked numerous miracles. He divided the waters of Jordan, having struck it with Elijah's mantle; he made the waters of a Jericho spring fit for drinking; he saved the armies of the kings of Israel and Judah that stood in an arid wilderness by bringing forth abundant water by his prayer; he delivered a poor widow from death by starvation through a miraculous increase of oil in a vessel. This Shunamite woman showed hospitality to the prophet, and through his prayer was gladdened by the birth of a son; the child later died, but he was raised back to life by Elisha. The Syrian military commander Namaan was healed from leprosy, but the prophet's servant Gehazi was then afflicted because he disobeyed the prophet and took money from Namaan.

Elisha predicted to the Israelite king Joash the victory over his enemies, and by the power of his prayer he worked many other miracles (4 Kings 3-13). The holy Prophet died in old age at Samaria. "In his life he worked miracles, and at death his works were marvelous" (Sirach 48:1-15). A year after his death, a corpse was thrown into the prophet's grave. As soon as the dead man touched Elisha's bones, he came to life and stood up (4 Kings 13:20-21). The Prophet Elisha and his teacher, Prophet Elijah, left no books behind them, since their prophetic preaching was oral. John of Damascus composed a canon in honor of the Prophet Elisha, and at Constantinople a church was built in his honor.

IN HONOR OF THE HOLY MARTYRS

The Sunday following Pentecost is All Saints Sunday, on which we remember all known and unknown saints. This ancient tradition came from the time when the early Church established a commemoration for the martyrs who suffered at the persecutions during the first three hundred years of Christianity. It was that commemoration that became the basis for All Saints Sunday.
