


January 2 marks the commemoration of the passing away of St. Seraphim of Sarov (1754-1833). He is one of the most beloved of Russian Saints and has also been recognized as an inspiring man of faith by Christians throughout the world. His life is accessible on the internet and also in books available in our parish library. Below is a spiritual characterization of this wonderful saint by a contemporary Russian priest:

St. Seraphim's tenderness was his special characteristic: It sprung from the depths of his God-loving heart. And this love of God, gained through suffering, allows us to truly love man precisely in recognition of his true calling. The love and tenderness of St. Seraphim envelops the entire person, contributing not only to his mental and bodily tranquility, but to his salvation in eternity. Today we lack people who comfort and inspire us to the spiritual life without flattering our self-love and egotism. Such was St. Seraphim! His affection, extreme heartfelt warmth, and love extended, as a rule, to those whose souls were softened by repentance or are at least inclined towards it. It is precisely to repentance that true love and spiritual tenderness encourage us to a great extent. But if the saint met an arrogant and proud man, ossified in sins and unwilling to change, we see completely different examples - no small severity and even accusatory harshness. However, this harshness was, in fact, filled with love for his salvation.

A NEW YEAR'S LETTER TO PARISHIONERS

Dear Parishioners,

Happy New Year! As we look to the future with anticipation of what will come, we also reflect on the past year and where we find ourselves now. While not quite as strange as 2020, for the most part, 2021 has been a year of moderate-to-mild anxieties. The Covid situation bounced us up and down all year, but as December arrived, conditions worsened. Cuyahoga County became a national leader in the number of people going into the hospitals. There are concerns as we enter the third year with Covid in the air. Regarding attendance at church services at this time, there are no changes to the current policies. We continue to follow guidelines of our Diocesan Archbishop Paul. His Eminence has stated that there are no religious reasons to avoid vaccination, and that masks are an acceptable prophylactic means of protection. Since several states comprise our Diocese, His Eminence has directed parishes to follow local mandates as they apply in each case. As no changes have been issued in Ohio or our County, we remain vigilant knowing the dangers that variants pose and do what we can to both avoid getting sick and spreading it to others.

Without question, Covid has produced drastic changes in parish life, and we do not see a return to pre-Covid normalcy any time soon. Thankfully, since opening up after the lockdown, our parish life has been able to continue in relative stability. We give God glory and thanks for His protection of our church, our parishioners, our families, neighbors and friends. Worship services and coffee hours take place on a regular basis, as do weekday services on appropriate occasions. The recent “pot-luck” luncheon was the first “special parish event” that we had in over a year. Covid protocols have somewhat relaxed at events in the hall, but we encourage people to remain mindful of social distance in being careful and cautious.

Covid or not, the parish's physical plant's needs and issues remain. We recently completed a major project on the hall roof. An unresolved problem has to do with the hall boilers. Supply chain problems are responsible for the fact that a new pump that was ordered in August has still not been delivered. The pump and the new hall roof are expensive issues. We have been able to pay for these and also maintain a comfortable balance in meeting the cost of on-going maintenance thanks to the wonderful generosity of you, dear parishioners. Such exemplary spirit of kindness and concern is worthy of praise. That “spirit” is the soul of the parish. Your spirit of good will and love for God has sustained Holy Trinity Church for over fifty years, and with it the parish will endure facing future challenges. Our church is as much “our home” as are the houses in which we live. It is the place of spiritual and emotional assurance, where we are always welcome, always comforted, always at peace in the presence of holy consolation.
