the following order can be used:***

*On a clean table, place an icon and a lit candle. Holy Water can be put into a bowl and sprinkled with an evergreen branch or by hand.*

*Begin by saying:*

In the Name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.  
Glory to You, our God, glory to You.

*Then:*

“O Heavenly King, the Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, etc.”

*And the Trisagion (Holy God, Holy Mighty, Holy Immortal....etc. through the “Our Father....”)*


*While sprinkling Holy Water through the home, the Tropar can be sung or said:*

When in Jordan, You were baptized, O Lord,  
the worship of the Trinity was made manifest,  
for the voice of the Father bore witness to You,  
calling You His beloved Son,  
and the Spirit in the form of a dove,  
confirming the truthfulness of His word.  
O Christ, our God, having revealed Yourself,  
And having enlightened the world, glory to You!

*After the blessing of the house, the following prayer may be said:*

O Lord, God, our Savior, Jesus Christ, who was baptized in the Jordan by John, and who entered the home of Zacchaeus bringing salvation to his habitation, do You, O Lord, bless this home, keep safe from harm all those who live here (*names can be inserted*), and also (*names*) who are absent. Fulfill their good desires, grant them Your blessings of bodily and spiritual well-being, protection from visible and invisible dangers, and all their petitions which are unto salvation and life eternal. For You are Our God, and to You we ascribe glory and honor, with Your Father, who is without beginning and the Holy, Good and Life-creating Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

**VENERATION OF THE PRECIOUS CHAINS OF THE HOLY APOSTLE PETER**

In about the year 42, on the orders of Herod Agrippa, the Apostle Peter was thrown into prison for preaching about Christ the Savior. In prison he was held secure by two iron chains. During the night before his trial, an angel of the Lord removed these chains from the Apostle Peter and led him out from the prison (Acts 12:1-11).

Christians who learned of the miracle took the chains and kept them as precious keepsakes. For three centuries, the chains were kept in Jerusalem, and those who were afflicted with illness and approached them with faith received healing. Patriarch Juvenal (July 2) presented the chains to Eudokia, wife of the emperor Theodosius the Younger, and she in turn transferred them from Jerusalem to Constantinople in either the year 437 or 439.

Eudokia sent one chain to Rome to her daughter Eudoxia (the wife of Valentinian), who built a church on the Esquiline hill dedicated to the Apostle Peter and placed the chain in it. There were other chains in Rome, with which the Apostle Peter was shackled before his martyrdom under the emperor Nero. These were also placed in the church.

On January 16, the chains of Saint Peter are brought out for public veneration.

### HOUSE BLESSING AT THEOPHANY

When the month of January comes around, people think about various things: whether or not their New Year's resolutions were really that important, or about whether or not it will be a snowy month; and if they're young, hoping that school days will be cancelled; or if they are skiers, whether or not they'll get some good skiing done; or perhaps they have thought about going to Florida for a few weeks; or about any number of other things. For Orthodox priests, the month of January brings thoughts about "House Blessings." If you put a couple of priests in a room together, they would engage in a spirited conversation about their experiences, with heroic accounts of blessing a hundred homes in a day, or driving through a white-out snowstorm on an unmarked back road, or about intriguing stories of older people who told tales of coming to America before World War I, or about children and pets who become so excited with the visit of a priest that they literally jumped up and down, or about other colorful and memorable things that happened.

In the course of an Orthodox priest's lifetime, there is nothing else quite like the tradition of House Blessings! It became a formal pastoral custom in recent times, but the tradition is an ancient one. The prayer of the Great Blessing of Water indicates that this Holy Water will be used for "cleansing of souls and bodies, unto healing of passions and unto the sanctification of homes." Blessing homes is simply a natural extension of the ritual of sanctification that takes place in the church. In times past, following the church services, priests would walk throughout the neighborhood to the surrounding houses. In my first parish in Buffalo, I actually did walk around the couple blocks to bless about a dozen homes. As nowadays parishioners live some distance from the church, car travel is necessary. And gone are the days when somebody was always at home, requiring in-advance planning between priest and parishioners.

The tradition of House Blessing was diminishing even before Covid. Most priests will tell you that it was never easy and it was not about getting a bit of extra cash. Back in the 1950's and 1960's, when priests were receiving miniscule salaries without any pension plans, house blessings were often a source of some supplemental income. But even then the real purpose was pastoral and not pragmatic. For a priest to be with parishioners at their homes, to bless their dwellings, to share in fellowship and conversation is a beautiful and meaningful spiritual experience. I always found such experiences rewarding and treasure memories of some really memorable visitations.

Because of the current Covid surge, I am not going "on the road" this year, but parishioners with special requests can call to arrange a blessing. In fact, however, house blessing does not require that it be done by a priest. It is easy enough to do, taking only ten minutes, if that. What a great way for a family to get together for a brief and inspiring spiritual experience. Parishioners can help themselves to the recently-blessed Holy Water, which will remain in the vestibule for another week. We are printing a brief "House Blessing Service" on the end page of *The Trinitarian*.
