HOLY MARTYRS LEONTIUS, HYPATIUS AND THEODULUS

The Holy Martyrs Leontius, Hypatius, and Theodulus were Roman soldiers. Leontius was military-chief in the imperial army of Tripoli during the first century. He was distinguished for his bravery and good sense, respected by the people of Tripoli for his virtue.


Governor of the Phoenician district, Adrian, had full power to hunt Christians and give them over to torture and death. He heard that Leontius had turned many away from worshipping the pagan gods. He sent the tribune Hypatius with a detachment of soldiers to Tripoli to find and arrest Leontius. Hypatius fell ill, near death, and saw in a dream an angel telling him to appeal to the God of Leontius. Hypatius told his friend Theodulus and the other soldiers of his dream; together they asked for help from the God Whom St. Leontius confessed, and Hypatius was immediately healed.

Hypatius and Theodulus hastened to Tripoli in search of St. Leontius. Upon their arrival in the city, a stranger met them and invited them to his house, where he lavishly hosted the travelers. Learning that this was St. Leontius, they fell on their knees and asked him to enlighten them with faith in the True God. They were baptized there, and when St. Leontius prayed over them, a luminous cloud overshadowed the newly-baptized and poured forth rain.

The remaining soldiers, in search of their commander, arrived in Tripoli, where the governor Adrian had also arrived. Learning what had happened, he ordered Sts. Leontius, Hypatius and Theodulus be brought to him. After threatening them with torture and death, he demanded that they renounce Christ and offer sacrifice to the Roman gods.

The martyrs firmly confessed their faith in Christ. So St. Hypatius was put under a column and raked with iron claws, and St. Theodulus was mercilessly beaten with rods. They remained steadfast in their faith and were beheaded.

After torture, St. Leontius was imprisoned. Adrian enticed him with honors and rewards, but continued tortures when that failed. The martyr was suspended head down from a pillar with a heavy stone about his neck, but nothing could make him renounce Christ. He was then beaten with rods until he died. His body was thrown outside the city, but Christians reverently gave him a burial near Tripoli. The deaths of these martyrs occurred between 70-79 AD.

THE FAST OF THE APOSTLES: ENTERING INTO THE SEASON

After a week of celebrating the great feast of Pentecost, celebrating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples and apostles, a week of full feasting with no fasting restrictions, we now turn to one of the four extended fasting seasons of the Church, the fast of the Apostles.

The Apostles' Fast varies in length from year to year, beginning from the day after the Sunday of All Saints, which moves according to the date of Pascha, and ending with the feast of the chief apostles, Peter and Paul. And this year our fast is 17 days.

"Wait, fasting during the summer? ... And miss the best time of the year for grilling hot dogs, brats, burgers, and ribs?..." If you haven't had such a thought at some point in your journey in the life of the Church, you are a pious person indeed!

And while fasting does involve voluntary loss of good and pleasurable things, it also involves voluntary and intentional dedication and focus on the best things.

The Apostles' Fast is a time of focusing on the work of the Church. The Fast focuses our attention on the continued establishment of the church, the empowering and gifting of the Holy Spirit, the proclamation of the Gospel, and the sending out of God's people to be His physical body in the world. When we say in the Creed that we believe in the "apostolic Church," we are not simply saying that this is a church established by the original apostles. We also are importantly saying that this church that we accept and follow is a church that is <u>sent</u>, because **apostolic means sent**. We are part of a *sent* church and in our activity, planning, and ministry, we never forget to be a church that *moves out* in love.

These days of fasting are a great time to rededicate oneself to the apostolic work of the church.

Along with fasting from certain foods as our church calendar prescribes, here are some possible ways to participate in this special season:

- Think missionally about those around you: pray for your neighbors, be open to and even intentional about spiritual conversations with people; invite a friend, neighbor, or co-worker to our church
- Read through the Acts of the Apostles in the Bible.
- Go on a prayer walk and ask God to bless homes, businesses, schools, and people that you pass and encounter.
- Get involved in international Orthodox Christian missions: support a missionary financially, pray for a missionary or for the Church in a particular land, sign up to go on a mission trip with OCMC.
- Pray for and support financially the mission parishes of the Diocese of the Midwest. Specifically, St. Stephen Orthodox Church in Lima, OH, is a mission parish in our state.
- Volunteer at St. Herman House or St. Mary of Egypt Mission or other important ministries in our city that seek to support those who are in need in our city.

May the Lord bless you as you deny yourself so that you may live for Him and His Gospel in these blessed days,
