#### SAINT JOHN THE MERCIFUL

St. John was born on Cyprus in the 7th century to illustrious parents. He married and had children, but when they died, he became a monk. He was zealous in fasting and prayer and had great love for those around him. His spiritual exploits won him honor among men, and even the emperor revered him. When the Patriarchal throne of Alexandria fell vacant, the emperor and all clergy begged St. John to occupy the throne.


St. John assumed his archpastoral service, concerning himself with the moral and dogmatic welfare of his flock. As patriarch he denounced every soul-destroying heresy, and drove out from Alexandria the Monophysite Phyllonos of Antioch.

He considered his chief task to be charitable and to help all those in need. He ordered his stewards to compile a list of the poor and downtrodden, which was over 7,000 men in Alexandria. The saint provided for all of these unfortunates each day out of the church's treasury.

On Wednesdays and Fridays he sat outside on the church portico and received everyone in need. He settled quarrels, helped the wronged, and distributed alms. Three times a week he visited the sick-houses and rendered assistance to the suffering. During this period the emperor Heraclius led an army against the Persians, who then ravaged and burned Jerusalem, taking a multitude of captives. Patriarch John gave a large portion of the church treasury for their ransom.

The saint never refused supplicants. One day when visiting the sick, he met a beggar and gave him 6 silver coins. The beggar changed clothes and ran ahead, and again asked St. John for alms. The Patriarch gave him 6 more coins. When the beggar sought charity for a third time, the servants began to chase him away; but St. John ordered he be given 12 pieces of silver, saying, "Perhaps he is Christ putting me to the test." Twice the saint gave money to a merchant suffering a shipwreck, and a third time gave him a ship belonging to the Patriarchate and filled with grain; the merchant had a successful journey and repaid his obligations.

St. John was known for his gentle attitude towards people. Once, he was compelled to excommunicate two clergymen for a period of time. One of them repented, but the other became angry with the Patriarch and fell into greater sins. The saint wanted to summon him and calm him with kind words, but it slipped his mind. When he was celebrating the Divine Liturgy, he suddenly remembered the Gospel words to first be reconciled with your brother and then offer your gift before the altar. The saint left the altar and called for the clergyman; he fell on his knees before him in front of all the people and asked forgiveness. The cleric, filled with remorse, repented of his sin, corrected himself, and afterwards was found worthy to be ordained to the priesthood.

## To Timothy, my true child in the faith: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. -- 1 Timothy 1:2.

All of us who were baptized and chrismated, who were initiated in the Orthodox Christian faith have at least one godparent. If you were baptized as a child, this person likely was a relative, a family friend, or perhaps someone from your parish whom your priest designated to stand in and watch over you. Some of us also have had the special joy of becoming godparents ourselves, sponsoring a child or an adult as he or she was received into the full life of the Church.

Being a godparent or sponsor is a greatly important role and a labor of love. It is a commitment to be a faithful Christian and witness, and also to guide and support your godchild. This role doesn't begin and end at the baptism service, but in the most ideal situations continues on for many years.

There are other ways for a spiritual parent/child relationship to develop. Biological parents can invest greatly in the spiritual growth of their children. Clergy can be guides to their flock. Lay people can develop deep and caring relationships between each other. (1 Tim 5:1-2, Titus 2:2-8).

Paul calls Timothy<sup>1</sup> his "true child in the faith." And as we explore this first epistle to Timothy, we will see more about how Paul greatly cares for Timothy as a person and also wishes to see him grow in his own ministry as a young bishop.

What are the things Paul asks first and foremost for Timothy and also as a standard greeting for many of his letters? "Grace, mercy, and peace."

Grace ( $\chi \acute{\alpha} \rho \iota \varsigma$ ) is a word that speaks of God's favorable disposition and corresponding action toward mankind. Grace is experienced by us as a gift and as joy, and Paul asks for this first in Timothy's life.

Mercy (ἔλεος) is God's steadfast love, his loving-kindness toward mankind. When we ask for God's mercy upon a person, we are asking him to be who he is; that is, to be a good God, faithful to his people, and to look down on us with love.

Peace ( $\epsilon i \rho \eta \nu \eta$ ) is a broad term that carries meanings of absence of hostility, prosperity, loyalty, and love. Ultimately peace is Christ himself (Eph 2:14, Is 9:6-7). There is a Messianic peace that we experience and enter into, and which we will experience in the never-ending kingdom. Peace is therefore related to Sabbath, which is the reign of God as he sits upon his throne, resting and ruling.

Are you a Christian spiritual father or mother to someone dear to you? Pray for that person often and for grace, mercy, and peace. My prayer is that as we move from the Liturgy in the church to the liturgy in the fellowship hall, the good things of God that we have been filled up with will spill over into our conversations at coffee hour, building us up as the body of Christ, and naturally developing relationships between each other as true parents and children in the faith.
