VENERABLE MARCELLUS, ABBOT OF THE MONASTERY OF THE "UNSLEEPING ONES"

St Marcellus was born in Apamea in Syria to wealthy parents who died when he was young. He studied at Antioch and then at Ephesus. He distributed his many possessions to the poor, sundering his ties to the world.

Under the guidance of an experienced elder at Ephesus, Marcellus followed the path of asceticism. He later went to Byzantium to St. Alexander, igumen of the monastery named "the Unsleeping." There the psalmody was done constantly, both day and night, by alternating groups of monks. Marcellus was zealous in watchfulness, fasting and prayer, receiving great spiritual talents and the gift of clairvoyance. He foresaw the day of Abba Alexander's death and his own election as igumen; Marcellus felt he was too young to rule others so he slipped away to visit and learn at other monasteries.

He later returned, to the great joy of the brethren. Abba John made Marcellus his closest assistant. Upon the death of Abba John, St. Marcellus was chosen igumen, despite his own wishes, and he remained in this position for 60 years.

News of his saintly life spread, and people came from afar for help. Many times they saw angels encircling the saint, attending and guarding him. The monastery thrived. So many monks came to place themselves under his direction that it was necessary to enlarge the monastery and church. Saint Marcellus received donations from believers for the expansion. A large church, hospital and hostel for the homeless were built. By his prayers, St. Marcellus treated the sick, cast out devils and worked miracles.

A monk sent to Ankara fell ill; near death he called out to his abba. At that very hour St. Marcellus heard his disciple and began to pray for him; the monk recovered at once.

When a ship with his monks came into danger on the Black Sea, the saint calmed the tempest by his prayers. When he was told of a fire raging at Constantinople, he prayed tearfully for the city, and the fire subsided as if extinguished by the tears of the monk.

St. Marcellus peacefully departed to the Lord in the year 485. His faithful disciple Lukian grieved terribly over him, but on the fifth day after the death, St. Marcellus appear to him and comforted him, foretelling his own impending end.

ARCHPASTORAL GREETINGS OF THE MOST REVEREND DANIEL ARCHBISHOP OF CHICAGO AND THE MIDWEST

ON THE RADIANT FEAST OF OUR LORD'S NATIVITY - 25 DECEMBER 2024

Make ready, O Bethlehem!
Let the manger be prepared!
Let the cave show its welcome!
The Truth comes and the shadow flees.
God is born of a Virgin and is revealed to men.
He is clothed in our flesh and makes it divine.
Therefore Adam is renewed and cries out with Eve:
"Thy favor has appeared on earth, O Lord,
for the salvation of the human race."

(from the Royal Hours of the Nativity of Christ)

Very Reverend and Reverend Fathers, Venerable Monastics, and Beloved Faithful,

"God is born of a Virgin and is revealed to men": as we sing these words, we recall the great mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God. Gathering in these holy days to celebrate in the churches and chapels throughout our Diocese, to reflect upon this great mystery, let us also turn our thoughts to the one who was instrumental in fulfilling God's plan for our salvation: Mary, the "One who gave birth to God the Word" and "truly Theotokos."

We are first introduced to Mary of Nazareth at the beginning of the Gospel of Luke when, just after having spoken her "yes" to the angel in the moment of the Annunciation, she begins her trip "in great haste" from her hometown of Nazareth to the hill country of Judah, to be with her elderly relative Elizabeth in her time of need. The angel Gabriel had revealed to Mary that Elizabeth was in her sixth month of pregnancy (Luke 1:26-38). This explains why Mary, who carried within her an even greater mystery, goes to see Elizabeth and stays with her for three months, until Elizabeth gives birth to John, the Forerunner and Baptizer of Christ.

In the meeting between these two women, it is the young one, Mary, who offers the first greeting. The Gospel tells us: "she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth" (Luke 1:40). After this greeting, Elizabeth feels enveloped in great wonder as she is filled with the Holy Spirit. This wonder and joy is echoed in her response to Mary: "And why is this granted me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?"

In celebrating the Nativity, we ourselves are called to recognize the moments of the miraculous which are part of our daily lives. And what are these miraculous moments in everyday life? The first place is in *the other*, in those around us, in whom we recognize a brother or sister, because since the birth of Jesus occurred, every human face is marked with the image of the Son of God. Above all, we encounter this miraculous presence of Christ in the face of the poor, because God Himself entered the world poor, and it was to the poor, in the first place, that He revealed Himself.

Another place in which we recognize the miraculous is within history, the chronicle of human life and experience. However, we run the risk of reading history backwards and outside of its Christian context. For example, we

generally think that history is defined by the rise and fall of governments, wars and conflicts, regulated by business and finances, and dominated by the powers of this world. But it is God, the God of Creation who entered human life, who defines and rules over human history. As Mary sings in the *Magnificat*, it is the Lord who puts down the mighty from their thrones and exalts those of low degree, who fills the hungry with good things and sends the rich away empty (Luke 1:52-53).

Yet another miraculous encounter is within the Church. To perceive the Church as miraculous means not limiting oneself to consider it only as a religious institution, but to embrace the Church as a mother who, despite any blemishes and wrinkles, allows the features of the beloved Bride of Christ the Lord to shine through—a Church that is able to recognize the signs of faithful love that God continuously sends her. This is the Church that always has her doors open wide, and her arms open to welcome everyone. Moreover, the Church, our Mother, goes out from her own doors to seek with a loving smile and warm embrace all those who are far off in order to bring them to the mercy of God. The Church herself provides this miraculous moment which we are invited to experience in these holydays of light and love.

God has given us all of Himself by giving His Only Son, who is all His joy. It is only with the heart of Mary, the humble and poor daughter of Zion, who became the Mother of the Son of the Most High, that it is possible to rejoice and be glad for the great gift of God and for His unpredictable surprise. Through the birth of Jesus, may she help us to perceive the miraculous which surrounds us every day—in our brothers and sisters, in the lived experience of history, and within the Church. In the birth of Jesus may we recognize the Gift of Gifts, the undeserved Gift who brings us His salvation.

In the spiritual atmosphere of joy and peace of the Nativity of Christ, I greet all of you with the joy of the Feast. Once again, I state my prayerful wish for peace: peace in families and homes, peace in parishes, peace in the ministry of our clergy and faithful, and peace for those who are suffering the horrors of war throughout the world, especially our brothers and sisters in Ukraine and in the Middle East.

As you gather with family, with your parish communities, and with all your loved ones, I send you my sincere fatherly greetings and archaestoral blessings. May the Lord grant you a bright and blessed celebration of the Birth of Christ and a New Year filled with an abundance of heavenly blessings.

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Holy Trinity,

Glory to Jesus Christ!

I would like to assemble an ongoing Building & Grounds Team for the continued care and maintenance of our facilities. We have many who offer their time and abilities regularly for the maintenance and good function of our church and I am so thankful to everyone who helps in big and small ways. I would like to coordinate our efforts by establishing a Building and Grounds Team that seeks to fulfill the items listed below. The initial meeting of the team will take place on January 26th after coffee hour, at which time, a schedule of regular meetings can be developed. Having experience in building and grounds maintenance is a plus, but participation is open to all who can give time and a helping hand. Please let me know if you'd like to participate on the team or you can just come to our organizational meeting.

Building and Grounds Team

- The team is open to any parishioners who wish to offer their assistance to the upkeep and maintenance of our building and grounds. Ideally, one or two of our council members will be a part of this team.
- The team will report to the council on a regular basis regarding its work.
- The team will determine a team leader to report to the council and to arrange team meetings.
- The team will meet on a regular basis throughout the year for planning and organizing of projects and activities. The team ideally would meet once a month, but should meet no less than 4 times a year.
- The team will conduct indoor and outdoor walkthroughs of the building and grounds, taking note of the condition of our facilities and what needs to be monitored and repaired.
- The team will help maintain a list, along with the parish council, of the top maintenance priorities of the church. This list will be kept in an accessible online location.
- The team will seek to determine which maintenance issues can be done in house and which might require hiring a contractor. Maintenance or building projects which require a contractor will need to be approved by the parish council.
- The team will be responsible for planning and enacting seasonal maintenance (e.g. winterization, landscaping and yard care, heaters, thermostat schedules, etc.)
- The team will plan multiple all-parish work days throughout the year (e.g. spring cleaning before Holy Week, outdoor work days).
- The team will seek to be informed of the weekly work our hired custodian does and the team will communicate with the priest and the custodian if special cleaning work needs to be done by the custodian.
